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MEMBERSHIP

We have at least 800 newsletters to mail, and we try to get 3 out each year. We had to drop over 100 this past few months. We have found nearly 50 people, new to our group.

We depend on yearly dues and PX to pay for office expense, printing, and mailing the NL. We have been able to save most of the Life dues, hopefully to help keep our 457th alive for years to come. We need our story to be told to future generations. This includes the 457th members and many other people interested in WWII history, airplanes. Many relatives and others want to receive a NL but also need to pay dues. We have carried over 100 for 5 or more years who have not paid dues regularly. We will have to drop all who have not paid dues or have not joined within one year. You may still attend Reunion, if you like, but without a vote on Association business. Widows of deceased 457th men who were Life Members, will continue as Life Members. We do exchange NLs with several other groups, as well as Officers of 8AFHS and Heritage Museum.

NO EXCUSE! JUST THE PLAIN TRUTH! PLEASE FORGIVE!!!

The 457th office has been closed from October 5, 1999 to January 8th, 2000. As MOST of you know, we have no Paid Employees. We couldn't, therefore, hire anyone. Volunteers are hard to find!

Our Reunion in Gettysburg, Oct. 10-14, '99, was Great! Afterwards, son David caught a plane for Bentonville, son Jerry drove Mom and Pop south to Panama City, FL to visit with Jerry's family, wife Carol, son and two daughters. Ten days later, we headed back north to Savannah, GA to join about 10 of our 457th people for several days at the 8AFHS reunion. We visited the 8th Heritage Museum. Touring it again brings tears. The outside garden is beautiful. We attended the dedication of the building...the Chapel of Fallen Eagles.

Soon, we were on the road again going west to Little Rock, AR. We stopped at North Little Rock Veteran Hospital. Homer had been told his spine just was not bad enough for surgery. No visits about his spine for over a year. Then, all of a sudden, they sent him to have surgery that very day. When the Dr. examined him, he said, "I have no idea what they are thinking. This should have been done years ago. You are not able to have any kind of surgery now and live." They set up heated pool exercise, (a temp not many have) at NLRockonly 6 hr. drive...one-way. Forget that. Then the next week we had to return for the information on the asbestos in Homer's lungs, which are full. It is not cancer, but no surgery; too late. It is hard to breathe. It is service connected.

At this point, it is late into November. With unloading and all, we are into Thanksgiving. All family, except Jerry, are here (28) for afternoon dinner. Through all this, Mickey's back with a burning pain worsened. It began after falling at Gettysburg. The motorhome bouncing for so many miles over potholes in road jarred me too much. Osteoarthritis, bone density...scoliosis really got big time pain. Before long, Drs. and more...then Christmas was here. With outside help, we managed Christmas--cleaning. baking---but no Christmas cards (maybe July 4th!!!) In a chair, I watched 30-some getting presents in the right hands, breakfast, and late afternoon dinner. Then the whole family, one by one or more, started having upper respiratory, with pneumonia, bronchitis, and strep throat. New Year's Eve, we kept a Dr. in Emergency hospital busy. New Year's was Mickey then Homer went to Fayetteville Veterans on Sunday and again on Monday to check his lungs. Light flu got it's hand in, too. Now we are better. Mickey had more x-rays on the pulled muscle in her back. The legs are really a lot better...taking celebrex. I really don't want to complain, because so many of you are much worse, just explaining why I was unable to get the work done. END RESULT: Late with all 457th work, newsletter, etc. one week after you receive this newsletter and if you have not received an answer to your requests, membership card, etc., please contact:

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Please send Mickey any articles, letters, or inquires to be printed in the Newsletter. Please do not send any Political issues not pertaining to Veterans Affairs.







CHAPEL OF THE FALLEN EAGLES 8TH AIR FORCE HERITAGE MUSEUM COMPLETION DATE, DECEMBER, 2000

457th BG Assn to sponsor window in the Chapel of the Fallen Eagles at the Eighth Air Force Heritage Museum in Savannah

At the Gettysburg Reunion, the Board voted to sponsor a stained-glass window in the Chapel, ground-breaking for which took place during the 8th AF Historical Society reunion, Oct. 29. This is the first Association-wide appeal for funds for the window. To date (January 1, 2000) donations total \$6,610 toward the \$15,000 goal. The down payment was made with totally unsolicited donations at the Gettysburg Reunion, and all these first donations have come only from those who attended Gettysburg. The enthusiasm of 457th members for this memorial project is now quite evident, and reaching our goal by the end of 2000 appears quite feasible.

The design of the window, which is gothic-style 3' x 5', is not yet final and will be reported to you in a later Newsletter. There will be a brass plaque below the window where an inscription will denote those whom we honor with this beautiful and lasting memorial. We have been allowed to choose which one of the eight side windows is ours. After considerable thought, we chose the second from the front on the left as one

enters. The choice was made on several factors, such as visibility from the usual activities areas, visibility from the entrance, the building's orientation to the sun, etc. We know you will be pleased with this choice.

At right is our "Fund-o-Meter", on which we will chart our progress toward the \$15,000 goal to fully \$10,000 fund the sponsorship of the memorial window. Your tax-deductible con-\$6,610 tribution will keep the level \$5,000 of the "Fund-o-Meter" rising. This graphic will be repeated in each Newsletter until the goal has been reached. Your donation will help to place a permanent memorial to all of the Fallen Eagles of our Group in a beautiful House of Worship.

What a Millennium Project for the 457th Bomb Group Association!! As Sec.-Treas. Homer Briggs has asked President Harris to manage the Memorial Window Fund, donations should be sent to Craig Harris, 2910 Welcome Drive, Durham, NC 27705. Checks should be made payable to "457th Bomb Group Assn." and noted "Memorial Window Fund". Every donation, no matter how small, will be gratefully received and will help us toward our goal. Our smallest donation so far is \$10, and the largest \$500. Donations of \$250 or more will be acknowledged with a letter suitable for IRS purposes.

We have made a terrific start. Now is the time for those who were NOT at Gettysburg to send their donation to this worthy project. And those who were at Gettysburg, but have not yet made your donation, now would be a great time to get it in. Send your donation today, and drive the "Fund-o-Meter" up!

2000 MINI-REUNION MAY 27 – 31 BULL HOTEL PETERBOROUGH



Planning for our reunion is well underway. I have talked with the Cambridge American Cemetery office and determined that the Memorial Service will be on Monday, May 29. We developed our schedule around this event, so that we may participate in this very impressive ceremony.

As in previous years, the basic guidelines are that you make your own travel arrangements to get to Peterborough and I will take care of all necessary accommodations over there. There is no need for any payment when you make your reservation with me. You will pay your hotel charges directly to the Bull when you check out — and they accept all major credit cards. I will collect from you — over there — for all other expenses—coach trips, admissions, banquet, etc.

Bernie Bains has again arranged for our accommodations at the Bull, but we don't have a firm quote on rooms at this time. In 1998, the rates were £ 47.25 (Pounds) single and £ 75.5 double/twin. Visit the Cambridge American Cemetery at Madingley for the Memorial Service and place a wreath for the 457th. Proceed to the Imperial War Museum at Duxford and visit the American Air Museum.

May 30, Tuesday:

Peterborough Day. Attend the Mayor's Reception in Council Chambers. Visit the Cathedral, etc. Reunion Banquet this evening at the Bull.

May 31, Wednesday:

Depart Peterborough for home — or more travel.

If you have any questions, please contact me. If you have not been to Glatton for 55 years, you may have some questions about trains, airport transportation, etc. Get your reservations to me promptly so we can be assured of getting every one a room at the Bull.



The Medal and Diploma commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Landings in Normandy an Provence and the Liberation of France

The medal struck by the Federation of French War Veterans Inc., in recognition by the French community of the Veterans who landed in Normandy and Provence and participated in the Liberation of France was first presented in New York City by 150 French people hosting 175 Veterans at the Armory of the Seventh Regiment on June 6, 1994, the 50th Anniversary of D-Day 1944.

Designed by Robert Perrot, a WW II-Veteran, the medal bears on the observe a blue-and-gold head of Lady Liberty with its diadem against a background of blue waves and at the bottom the Cross of Lorraine on a red background. The lettering in gold reads "Cinquantenaire des Débarquements" within the inner red ring and "1944 Normandie Provence 1994 Liberation of France" on the outer ring. This is a two sided die-struck round brass medal, 2 inches in diameter, in 3 soft enamel colors with a gilding-gold finish, topped by a metal loop. A tricolor neck ribbon is attached by 2 rings.

The reverse commemorates the 75th Anniversary of the Federation of French War Veterans Inc. with its insignia and "1919-1994".

The 8 % x II" Diploma, - Diplôme d'Honneur de la Médaille du Cinquantenaire, accompanying the medal of the 50th Anniversary of the Landings of Normandy and Provence and the Liberation of France, is conferred by the Federation of French War Veterans Inc. on Veterans who qualify by virtue of service in France in WW II.

Who qualifies: All Veterans who landed in Normandy or Provence and all Veterans who participated in the Liberation of France are entitled to the diploma and the medal. A contribution of \$24,50 would be appreciated to help cover costs.

How to claim the medal and the diploma: Please return the attached coupon with a copy of your "Service record and Report of Separation-Honorable discharge" with your check or money order.

I read a lot about the VA cut backs and would like to share my war story with vou. I am a service-connected disabled vet now receiving Social Security disability. I had been going to the VA hospital in Sheridan, Wyoming. Last month, I moved to Portland, Oregon, for health reasons. I went to the Portland VA hospital recently to renew my medications and receive treatment for my service-connected problem. I was re-enrolled and told to go to the emergency room, as I could not make an appointment since no new patients were being accepted at the Portland hospital or at any other VA hospital in Oregon. At the emergency room, the doctor said she could only give me two weeks of medications and basic emergency treatment. She suggested I go to a private doctor for medication and treatment for all medical help. I was placed on a waiting list and told that in a year or two I might be able to see a VA doctor and again get treatment and medication from the VA. It was suggested I use Medicare. Medicare will not cover any prescriptions and only half of the treatments at a reduced rate. Most doctors will not accept Medicare patients unless the patient can pay the difference between what they charge and what Medicare pays. With only \$795.00 a month income, I do not have that luxury. Nor can I get state help. As it stands now I will go without medications and treatments, while our members of Congress enjoy their new raise and free medical care - at our expense. 





This is a story of escape and evasion, of how the author, after being shot down by ground fire while strafing an enemy aerodrome, evaded capture, fought side by side with the Maquis (Free French), and finally after one unsuccessful attempt, made good his escape back to England and his fighter squadron.

He admits that his book is no award winner, and that no-one, even in a fit of kindness, will ever refer to it as being well written, but it is an unusual story, and fortunately a different part of the war than most experienced.

On the day he was shot down, the Maquis (F.F.I., French Forces of the Interior), who had been fighting an underground war since the fall of France, received orders from General DeGaulle that they had been impatiently waiting for, to rise up with arms against their German conquerors.

The story was written shortly after the author's return to England while on R. and R. A very few portions of the story have been rewritten for the sake of continuity

and clarity, but great care was taken not to disturb the words, thoughts, and impressions of a young fighter pilot at that time and during those years.

Names and places were changed back then for reasons of security and the protection of the individuals and their families.

This is but one story, by one person, of the many that still remain unwritten.

He mentions, that only if the French took the time to speak very slowly, and sometimes at his request to repeat themselves, was he entirely certain of the daily game plan. Without a clue, he knew that picks, shovels, and a pile of dynamite in the back seat of their Citroen meant they were going to blow up a bridge. However, at other times when he thought he had it hacked, it did come as a bit of a surprise when they wound up in the brothel of the town he thought they'd come to liberate.

All of us as kids have delivered hand bills, but he says it was something else tossing the La Marseillaise Du Berry or Le Department out of the window of a Citroen travelling at full bore through a town occupied by the enemy.

During the author's forty some odd years of flying, he has logged several thousand hours in every type of aircraft from homebuilts to jet fighters and heavy multi-engine.



In the interests of saving time, we sure wish you had eMail -- as time is growing short!

We just returned from Scattle and Vancouver. While in Scattle, we visited a former pilot training student of mine who retired from the USAF and from Boeing. He took us through the B-747 production line, and then we went over to a little Boeing building on Paine Field. Off-duty employees of Boeing are building FIVE Messerschmitt 262 jet fighters. They got an original from the Navy that had been mothballed for over 50 years. They opened it up, and not only were the 30 mm cannons intact, they still had live ammo in them — which they fired, and the U. S. ATF guys came in and confiscated the ammo amid a lot of excitement and thrashing about.

The plane is in mint condition, but it is made of steel, since the Germans did not have the aluminum technology then -- so it's pretty heavy. Boeing will make five of them from aluminum by duplicating the steel parts. Daimler-Benz is even going to build new engines for the five birds. It is a fascinating project. They will be used for museums, tours, movies, etc. We must all be thankful that Hitler decided to concentrate on bombers instead of the Me262 back in 1943. Had he not, I am convinced we would have lost the war, as we would never have achieved air superiority. Same stupid decisions being made now about our F-22 Raptor.

Dear Mr. Briggs,

I am writing in the hope that you can assist my research into a B-17 crew who force-landed in Ireland on 24 January 1944. I obtained your (association) name and address from "The Aviation Connection" supplement in the May 1998 issue of "FLYPAST" aviation magazine.

My hobby is military aviation history in its many aspects. However, the one area I research is the story of the Allied and German airmen whose aircraft crashed or force-landed in or off neutral Ireland during World War II. Over 40 American-crewed aircraft crashed or landed here from 1942 to 1945. One of these was a B-17G, 42-97443, from the 749th Bomb Squadron of the 457th Bomb Group. The crew force-landed near Belmullet in County Mayo on 24 January 1944 due to adverse weather and lack of fuel.

The 10 crew were uninjured and were not interned. Instead, they were handed over at the border with Northern Ireland. The crew were:

While I have quite a lot of information about the landing, I know nothing about the crew or their subsequent fates. Can you or your unit historian/archivist please tell me anything about them? Details such of date of birth, home town and state, awards, missions, etc. would be of great interest. Did some or all survive the war? If any are still members of your association could you put me in touch with them? That would be of tremendous value to my research.

I received your letter and thought about it overnight, the more I thought about it, the more I began to think about the ship's #. I called a friend and asked him about his crash and it was his plane. He will write to you as

soon as he gets a copy of your letter, from me.

Another friend was the crew chief. I called them both and they both will write to you. I am getting a newsletter ready and will put it in the news. I will send a copy to you. This is the second letter we have gotten in a month, that we solved the mystery right away. The other one was from a man in Germany telling about a POW camp, where a crew member (the very same crew of 086) was in same camp he was and he knew he had gotten away and was killed later. None of the Crew or AF had know how he died. The German man wanted the American man's family address.

The pilot of this plane recently (a few months ago) died. He had lived in Spokane, Wa 749 Sqn. Russell Karl of Peru, Il will write to you. He was a radio-qunner.

You may have your answers soon.

Dear Mr. Briggs,

In January 1993, I wrote a letter to you about a bomber that crashed in France during September 10, 1944, but I made a mistake, because the plane for which I had to seek information was in reality a B-24 that belonged to the 446 BG (It crashed the same day). Before I understood that I had made a mistake, Russ Karl, the radio-man of a B-17 (the wrong plane) wrote a letter to me.

Gene Forton, the only survivor of the B-24 came to France in September 1994 for a ceremony, but Russ Karl and his wife Ella came too! One year later, we visited them in Illinois and they came back again. During 1997, we returned to the States and they came again in 1998 and 1999! I think you know more about that story (Russ probably told you...). Finally, it was a good mistake because Russ and Ella became very good friends and this year, we went to the exact place where the B-17 serial 42-32086 "You Never Know" came down.

Since many years I try, with some other researchers, to locate the places where so many planes came down. On the crash sites, we can still find many small metal parts that can often help to identify the plane's type. I go often to the mountains and the forest with my metal detector. Hundreds of planes crashed east of France (Strasbourg is located near the border and the Rhine river), and there are so many stories behind these airmen.

On May 27, 1944, B-17s of the 457th left Glatton for a mission to Ludwigshaffen (see book "Flak Dodger" by Roland Byers page 163 and your book "Fait Accompli" page 52, a gift from Russ with your signature inside... Thank You...). Ship 42-31594 from the 751 BS was shot down by German fighters and the pilot 2Lt. Artie J. Whitlow was killed. Missing Air Crew Report is 5299.

I write to you about that plane because I think it crashed not far away from my hometown, near a village called **Bergheim**. Maybe some crew members are still alive and have some recollection about that day and where the plane crashed. I will see if I can find some witnesses who can help to locate the exact crash place.

Maybe a friend from France asked you about that plane some time ago, and if so, let me know. Thank you in advance for all information and I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy new Year.

This article "BAPTISM OF FIRE" was written by Larry Horras for the 57th anniversary of the 320 th Bombardment Group. Larry, a retired AF Colonel, flew 75 WW II missions with the 42nd Bombardment Wing. He has been awarded the Silver Star, Soldiers Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with Thirteen clusters, and the Purple Heart. The Arbatax mission was flown from North Africa in a formation of 18 unescorted B-26 Marauders in early April of 1943.



BAPTISM OF FIRE

THE RAID ON ARBATAX- APRIL 23,1943

The morning of April 23,1943 began with Sgt.Jack Selikson and his ungentle shaking of the cot, sleeping bag, and finally the person of the sleeping combat crewman. Sgt.Selikson began the moment of truth on the day when the 320th would experience its first aerial combat. No great event but a small engagement in a big war was in the offing. What was happening? This was Tunisia and the Africa Corps and their Desert Fox had lulled us with Lili Marlene the previous night. How now does the mission trend? Sometime during the night the teletype delivered the target. It wasn't much. Arbatax on the easten coast of Sardinia, and who had ever heard of that. In later years jet setters led by the Aga Kahn called it the Coasta Esmeralda famous for its friendly combination of beach, sky, and sun. In April 43 the beaches were bare, the sun did shine and the skies were not the least bit friendly. The 320th was enroute to the target on its 2nd mission ever, the first having been flown uneventfully the previous day. The Flight leaders are in their places, the gunners are alert traversing their guns, and all are ready. We trip the light fantastic leaving the coast line at Bone and threading the narrow path between Sardinia and the Italian boot. This is great, a terrific view of the Med, the sun shining, and all pilots holding station as the quest goes on. Now comes the turn on target. The flights shift into trail, the lead bombardiers pick out their aiming points, the pilots follow the PDI and we are on our bomb run. Lots of standardized communications between pilots and bombardiers. The pilots follow the bombardiers, the bombardiers follow the Norden bomb sight. Altitude airspeed and course are delicately adjusted and then bombs away. The big tailed bird gives an involuntary shudder as four thousand pound bombs depart from the wartime womb of the B 26. Falling earthward they are lethal mail addressed to whom it may concern. The sinister projectiles course earthward with their deadly mesage. The target, a harbor for E boats and assorted enemy war materiel was unduly aroused by the thunder of tons of bombs breaking over their littoral and usually placid scene.

In the meantime, back in the Marauders, the Group went from trail to a diamond formation and headed for home. All hands relaxed and the word was passed that the smoking lamp was lit. Casually, the twenty four planes and their relaxed crews set sail for Montesqui. How peaceful was the balmy spring day. The sun was shining, the cumulo nimbus flirted playfully with wisps

of sunshine and the great Pratt and Whitneys sang their triumphant song. So, as the Lucky Strike Green has gone to war were puffed so lustilly by the relaxed crews, a stranger appeared flying on course with the bombers but faster. It was an ME 109. The first one in the two day combat history of the 320th TO CHALLENGE our right of passage. We were invited to the dance and our book was full as more ME 109s came into view. Our stalwart band continued on course to Africa. The fighters had a different notion. Like a pack of wolves stalking their prey, they continued to harry us. Fast and sleek, they began their atttack, hitting us from all angles as a wolf worries a less agile animal. Their atttacks were unhurried and deliberate. We, in an airborne sort of way, circled the wagons by tightening our formation. The contest was a battle of wills. The single engine fighters darted in and out using their entire plane as a gun platform while we fought with traversing weapons from a fixed position in the plane. After about thirty minutes of sustained action, the coast of Africa appeared. The enemy was not inclined to cross this boundary but before they left one pilot flew well ahead of our formation then turned and attacked us head on. It was a collision course but somehow, he wiggled thru the formation. It looked like a suicide and we were pleased that he did not succeed. The contestants disengaged at the coast line and the battle was over. The mystery of combat had been breached. The magic of suvival had prevailed. The heat of battle had forged an eternal bond and the callowness of youth had been forever changed to the steel of manhood.

Postscripts to the mission include a damged airplane that crash landed adjacent to the coastal railroad. The crew flagged down a passing train and rode back from this mission in the commandeered freight train. Gordon Friday please take note. Also noteworthy was the extremely damaged plane piloted by Carl Hoy that defied engineering principles by remaing aloft when no longer flyable. Respect is awarded to the ME 109 pilot who authored the frontal attitack with the objective of splitting our formation. He flew parallel with us until he achieved about a two mile lead. Then he turned and came directly at the center of our formation. Our speed plus his added to a closure rate of about 550 miles per 'hour. Then he had the guts to slip by my flight and the lead flight with less than fifty yards of space to get thru. I can still see his goggled face as he went by. Arbatax was the Groups first encounter with an airborne enemy. It was an event and everyone who participated shared in this bonding experience.




