#### THE PRESIDENT SEZ:

FIRST ITEM IS A REPORT ON THE PETERBOROUGH CATHEDRAL MEMORIAL MARKER. SINCE THE LAST BULLETIN, WITH THE HELP OF BERNIE BAINS, WE HAVE RECEIVED ENCOURAGEMENT FROM THE MAYOR'S ASSISTANT, MR. J. P. HARDY, THAT THE CHURCH MIGHT ALLOW US TO PLACE A SMALL METAL MARKER OR A STAINED GLASS IN, ON, OR ABOUT THE CATHEDRAL. NO PROMISES. IT APPEARS THAT THEY ARE NOT GOING TO ACCEPT OUR BENCH.

BUT, ALL HAS BEEN SILENT SINCE THEN. I CALLED BERNIE BAINS THIS MORNING (MARCH 1) AND HE ALSO HAS NOT HEARD A WORD FROM THEM. AT THIS POINT WE HAVE NO ALTERNATIVE BUT TO WAIT. PERHAPS WE WILL HAVE A POSITIVE REPORT BY THE TIME WE GO TO RENO.

IN THE MEANTIME WE HAVE OTHER BUSINESS TO TAKE CARE OF. THE FIRST BEING THE "ENGLISH HISTORIANS FUND". IT IS DEPLETED. THEIR NAMES ARE LISTED ON THE BACK PAGE OF THE BULLETIN. THEY ARE INVALUABLE TO US AT THE MINI-REUNION IN PETERBOROUGH AND ON OUR PERSONAL VISITS. OF COURSE, BERNIE AND SADIE BAINS WORK FOR THE 457TH THE YEAR AROUND. AND, THEY ARE ALL OUR DEAR FRIENDS. I AM SENDING HOMER AND MICKEY A CHECK TODAY, AND I WOULD LIKE TO ASK YOU TO DO THE SAME, SO WE CAN ASSIST AS MANY OF OUR ENGLISH FRIENDS TO ATTEND THE REUNION AS POSSIBLE. PLEASE DESIGNATE TO HOMER AND MICKEY THAT IT IS FOR THE ENGLISH HISTORIAN'S FUND. I KNOW YOU WILL BE GENEROUS.

NEXT, I FIRMLY BELIEVE WE HAVE REACHED THE TIME IN OUR GREAT ASSOCIATION WHEN WE MUST MAKE A DECISION REGARDING THE QUESTION OF WHERE WE ARE GOING TO DEPOSIT THE MEMORABILIA WE HAVE ACCUMULATED OVER THE YEARS. I PROPOSE WE MAKE THIS "HARD" DECISION IN RENO. IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT RON BYERS' ARTICLE IN THE LAST BULLETN POINTED OUT THE URGENT NEED FACING US TO MAKE THIS DECISION. I FEEL THE WORST THING WE COULD DO IS POSTPONE FACING THIS ISSUE AND END UP WITH NO PLACE TO GO. I HATE TO TELL YOU THIS, BUT .. WE NEED TO THINK IN TERMS OF "NOW".

THESE MEMORABILIA ARE GENERALLY PHYSICAL ARTIFACTS, OR THOSE IN THE FORM OF WRITING, PICTURES AND ILLUSTRATIONS. THEY ARE INDIVIDUALLY OWNED OR THEY BELONG TO THE ASSOCIATION. MANY OF US WOULD RATHER KEEP OUR PERSONAL MEMORABILIA IN THE FAMILY TO BE HANDED DOWN TO SUCCEEDING GENERATIONS. SOME OF US FEEL WE WOULD RATHER DONATE THEM TO A MUSEUM. MOST OF THOSE OWNED BY OUR ASSOCIATION ARE PUSHING THE WALLS OUT AT THE BRIGGS' RESIDENCE IN BENTONVILLE, ARKANSAS.

STORY OF THE 457TH IF WE COULD AGREE TO PLACE THEM ALL IN ONE MUSEUM. IT ALSO SEEMS OUR CRITERIA FOR CHOOSING THIS MUSEUM WOULD BE ITS PERMANENCY, HOW CENTRALLY IT IS LOCATED IN THE COUNTRY, AND HOW ACCESSIBLE IT IS TO MAJOR HIGHWAYS. EQUALLY IMPORTANT MIGHT BE THE KIND OF CONSIDERATION WE WOULD GET FROM THE MUSEUM AS TO PROMINENTLY DISPLAYING OUR MEMORABILIA, MUSEUMS HAVE A HISTORY OF ACCEPTING PEOPLES PROPERTY AND MONEY, PILING THEM UP (NOT THE MONEY) IN A STORAGE ROOM AND NEVER PUTTING THEM ON DISPLAY.

THE MOST PREVALENT MUSEUM NAMES WE HAVE USED IN THE PAST ARE (1) THE AIR FORCE MUSEUM AT WRIGHT-PATTERSON FIELD IN OHIO; (2) THE 8TH AIR FORCE MUSEUM AT BARKSDALE AFB, LOUSIANA; AND (3) THE MIGHTY EIGHTH AIR FORCE HERITAGE CENTER NOW BE CONSTRUCTED ON 12 ACRES IN SAVANNAH, GEORGIA... AND; NOW COMES A STRONG "PITCH" FROM IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT RON BYERS, FOR A NEW FORMING MUSEUM AT WENDOVER FIELD, UTAH .... WHERE THE 457TH GATHERED IN 1943 BEFORE WE PROCEEDED TO GRAND ISLAND, NEBRASKA AND THENCE ON TO GLATTON. I PLAN ON DRIVING TO RENO AND GOING BY TO TAKE A LOOK AT WENDOVER FIELD.

THE FLOOR IS GOING TO BE OPEN FOR DISCUSSION IN RENO TO DISCUSS THESE MUSEUMS OR ANY OTHERS YOU MAY WISH TO DISCUSS. IF YOU WOULD HAVE A PREFERENCE, PLEASE BE PREPARED TO SPEAK IN SUPPORT OF IT. I WILL OFFICIALLY WRITE AND COMMUNICATE WITH ALL FOUR OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED MUSEUMS AND WILL HAVE A WRITTEN REPORT IN YOUR RE-UNION ENVELOPE TELLING YOU WHAT I WILL HAVE FOUND OUT. IF YOU FAVOR ANOTHER LOCATION, PLEASE WRITE ME THE DETAILS AND I WILL INCLUDE IT IN MY REPORT.

ONE OTHER THING. HOMER AND MICKEY HAVE INFORMED ME THAT OUR LIFE MEMBERSHIP FUND HAS NEVER BEEN TOUCHED AND THAT WE ARE APPROACHING THE MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE RE: BY LAW. I AM NOT SUGGESTING THAT WE GET BUSY AND SPEND IT. BUT I AM SAYING THIS MIGHT BE A PLACE TO JUDICIOUSLY USE AT LEAST A PORTION OF IT.

IT SEEMS IT WILL BE NECESSARY TO PUT MOST OF OUR WRITTEN MATERIAL ON MICROFILM, OR SOME KIND OF FILM, FOR IT TO BECOME A PERMANENT RECORD. THIS WILL TAKE TIME AND MONEY. YOUR THOUGHTS, PLEASE.

THE FLOOR IS GOING TO BE OPEN, ALSO, FOR SOMEONE (OR MANY) ... WE HOPE SOMEWHERE IN THE EAST ... TO GIVE US A GOOD PLAN TO HOST THE 1997 REUNION. DON'T FORGET, THE BEST PLAN USUALLY WINS.

### EXERCISES YOU CAN DO

The exercises listed here can serve as a starting point for a back exercise program. Keep the following points in mind as you work through each exercise:

Do not hold your breath as you exercise. Try to breathe normally.

 Limit what you can do according to your pain level. Perform each exercise up until the point that you feel pain. It is still helping your back even if you only do a little, pain-free movement.

 If some problems exist that prevent you from doing an exercise, such as a knee problem, try to find a position where you can duplicate the same exercise movement.

 If you can only do a few repetitions of each exercise, try to do them two to three times a day. Exercises and information courtesy of Sports Rehabilitation & Physical Therapy Associates, Inc., Kansas City, Missouri

#### 1 Trunk Rotation



Lie on your back with your knees bent and feet flat on the floor or bed. Keeping your shoulders flat, slowly roll your knees first to the left, then to the right. Keep constant movement for two minutes. A smaller motion is better than a larger motion.

#### 2 Pelvic Tilt



Lie on your back with your hands on your stomach. Bend your knees and place your feet flat on the floor or bed. Tighten your stomach muscles to flatten your lower back against the floor or bed. Hold for five seconds. Then relax. Repeat 10 times.

#### 3 Single Knee to Chest



Lie on your back. Do Pelvic Tilt, then using both hands, grasp one leg behind the knee and pull your knee to your chest. Relax Pelvic Tilt muscles. Hold for five seconds, then slowly lower your leg. Repeat with other leg. Optional: Double Knee to Chest. Same as Single Knee, but before lowering leg, pull up the other knee to chest and hold both legs for five seconds. Lower one leg first, then the other. Repeat 10 times.

#### 4 Back Movement



Assume a position on your hands and knees. With your head in a neutral position, allow your trunk to sag. Do not pull it down, but allow it to relax. Round your lower back up toward the ceiling, contracting your



stomach muscles, but not your hip or thigh muscles. Move at waist level. Continue to alternate between sagging and rounding your trunk. Hold each position for five seconds. Repeat 10 times.


#### 5 Lower Back Stretch



Assume a position on your hands and knees similar to the Back Movement. Slowly sit back on your feet and dip your head down in the same movement. Hold for 10-20 seconds. Slowly rise back up on hands and knees. Repeat 10 times.

#### 6 Hamstring Stretch



Lie on your back with a pillow under your head. Do Pelvic Tilt, then grasp one knee from behind with both hands, and pull it toward your chest. Relax Pelvic Tilt muscles. Straighten your leg to the point of tightness, about a 45° angle. Hold for 10 seconds and relax. Repeat five times.

#### 7 Prone Extension



Lie on your stomach. Prop your upper body on your elbows. Maintain for one minute. Optional: Prone Extension. Lie on your stomach. Keep your hips down and use only your arm muscles to push up your upper body. Extend only to the point of pain. Hold for five seconds and relax. Repeat 10 times.

All the little advertizing mottoes from the past generations. But for many people, unfortunately, the results of all that Chesterfield satisfaction, Mr. Lucky's war efforts, or exercise (I'd walk a Mile for a Camel is the serious lung disease known as Bullous Emphysema.

Ruth Siler (husband Bill is a past president of the 457th and was a Navigator in the 748th) suffers from this experience of her youth. She stopped smoking in 1975, but not before extensive damage was done. On 6 March 1995 she had an operation at the Wakabayashi Institute at Irvine California. This technique, developed in recent years, is Thoracoscopic Lasar Pneumoplasty. The surgery Ruth had done reduced the Bullae (balloon-like air cysts that developed from smoking) in her right lung so as to give the lung increased expansion in the chest cavity. She is recovering nicely at the time of this publication and her many friends can expect to see her at Reno in November if all continues to go well. At some future time, she may return to the Institute for a left-lung proceedure; most patients, but not all, eventually have both lungs treated.



### Last Flight of an Aerial Gunner

(From Florida Chapter Newsletter)

At 0800 on 27 September 1991, a bomber crew assembled in the briefing room of the 328th Bombardment Squadron, 93rd Bombardment Wing, Castle AFB, CA. A mission was being planned that was to be the last flight on which an Aerial Gunner would be a member of a bomber crew. This was a very sad moment in the history of the US Army Air Corps, the USAAF, and the USAF.

This flight brought to an end an era in which Aerial Gunners fought and bled to establish a great heritage. It was a "Last Flight" that made history, with a "live" gunnery training mission featuring Student Gunner Airman First Class Patrick J. Torres and Instructor Gunner Senior Master Sergeant John Stanton.

The Gunners did themselves proud, as did the maintenance men who prepared the ASG-15 fire control system. They went out in a blaze of glory, true to their heritage with a 100% "fireout."

At 1100 on 22 November 1991 a ceremony was held at Castle AFB to honor Aerial Gunners and to remove the guns from B-52 #2595 so that they could take their place in history in Castle Air Museum. Guest Speaker Brigadier General Phillip Ford, SAC Deputy Chief of Staff, stated that SAC crew gunners had done their job so well that they were no longer needed. The .50 caliber guns were then dedicated 'to all Gunners past and present for their steadfast vigilance, to all maintenance people for their never-ending support, and to all KIAs, MIAs, and POWs—WE WILL NEVER FORGET YOU." (All bomber crews say AMEN to that! JWH)





### **Air Force Combat Crews May** Have Been Treated With Excessive **Radium Therapy**

By Ray Pytel, 445th Bomb Group

An important article in the Sept. 10, 1994 issue of SCI-ENCE NEWS describes an experimental massive radiation treatment of some WWII high altitude airmen and submariners afflicted with aerotitis. Typical symptoms included pain in descent, temporary deafness, vertigo, nausea, ringing in the ears, bleeding, and even ruptured eardrums.

The treatment, called "nasopharyngeal-radium therapy, involved the insertion of encapsulated radium deep into the nostrils, which delivered a hefty dose of radiation to a small region at the base of the brain. Data in recent studies show increased risk of brain cancer in subjects receiving this treatment.

There apparently is no listing of those receiving this treatment, so a clearinghouse has been established for all servicemen in Quincy, Massachusetts called the Submarine Survivors Group. They provide information on possible risks, and have established a telephone hot line ( ). The mailing address is Submarine Survivors Group, Quincy, MA.

All WWII airmen who had ear problems with subsequent "therapy" are advised to contact the Submarine Survivors Group and also inform their physician of the possible radiation over-exposure while in the service.







At our annual meeting in San Diego, CA in October of this year, The Eight Air Force Historical Society went on record in opposition to the originally planned exhibit "The Last Act. The Atomic Bomb and the End of WW II", sometimes referred to as The Engola Gay Exhibit.

The Eight Air Force Historical Society, for your information, is an organization of some 20,000 members composed of veterans of the 8th Air Force during WW II and the present day, spouses, historians and friends of the 8th.

The 8th Air Force was not an active participant in the war in the Pacific, having waged "our" war against the Nazi Germany war machine in Europe. However, in deference to the 26,000 8th A F members killed, 18,000 wounded and over 28,000 prisoners of war, our Society is greatly disturbed by the attempt of your curators to rewrite history instead of just telling it.

It is our understanding that provisions have been made to bring this exhibit in line with accurate facts, fairness and with Title 20 U S Code Sections 77a and 80a. To do otherwise would be an affront to an entire generations of Americans and the Veterans of WW II.

The credibility of Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum is at stake and we sincerely hope your fine institution will rise to the occasion and present this exhibit as an honest representation of facts in compliance with the Institution's Charter in law.

Dear Mr. Briggs:

I am pleased to report that The Heritage Center is progressing well according to plan. The Board of Directors and particularly the officers (EXCOM) of the board have been active in every phase of the project. The Chatham County Board of Commissioners and the Administrators have been essential in the development of the entire project and deserve our collective appreciation. If the Chatham County Commissioners had not embraced this unique undertaking in August 1993, we may never have gotten underway.

Following a competitive bidding process, contracts to build the facility and develop the museum feature were signed in late 1994 with two contractor teams. The Pickle Barrel Corporation, based in Savannah, Georgia, and composed of Scott Barnard Associates, the architect, and J.T. Turner Construction, Co., the builder, are producing the facility. Exhibitgroup, Inc. of Atlanta, Georgia is producing the museum feature within the facility. There are several subcontractors on the overall team working on site work, exhibit design and audio-visual aspects of the project.

Site work began the first week of October 1994 with the clearing of the trees on the 12 acres located at the intersection of I-95 and U.S. 80. Heavy rains delayed further work until 12 December, when clearing resumed and grubbing operations began. Back filling work began in January and is now essentially complete for the entrance way, parking lot and building sub grade. Further grading of the entire site will follow. The final design of the basic building has been completed and approved by The Heritage Center staff and EXCOM. Steel for the building was ordered in mid February and will be delivered to the site in April. Concrete pouring for the building slab will begin in March and be completed in April. Building erection should begin shortly thereafter and the schedule calls for the building to be complete by the end of October. Interior layout and design work continues and should be complete in March.

Phase one of the design for the exhibit elements of the museum was completed on 21 December and presented to the EXCOM for approval. General approval with minor modifications was given. Exhibitgroup contractor work was put on hold in January pending a thorough staff review of the exhibit plan in terms of content and budget guidelines. Having completed this action, phase two of the exhibit plan effort resumed work this month. The exhibit plan will take the visitor from the immediate pre WWII period through the war and then into the post war period. The post WWII period will include exhibit elements of the Cold War, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam conflict and Desert Shield/Storm. The focus, of course, will be the contributions of The Mighty Eighth in each of these actions. About 75-80% of the plan will be devoted directly to WWII and tell the full story of The Mighty Eighth's operations, including not only the fighting and flying story, but also the story of the ground crews, depots, headquarters and all support elements.

The second issue of *The Heritage* is enclosed. Please note the articles indicating a need for memorabilia and artifacts. Let us know what items you have and are willing to donate to the museum. Many individuals have done so already to support the overall exhibit plan. There will also be a room in the museum designated for a number of individual unit displays of memorabilia and artifacts. It will be up to the individual units to produce what they want displayed and designate a point of contact to work with the staff to develop these displays.

In addition to a museum, The Heritage Center will also include a gift shop, food service area, art gallery, library, archival area, education center space and administrative office space, all in a two story building with 80,000 (plus) square feet of floor space. Additionally there will be memorial gardens and a small chapel to the rear of the facility. The program is on schedule for a May 1996 opening.

Key to the success of The Heritage Center project is fund raising! Although Chatham County is providing the initial funding through the sale of revenue bonds, these bonds must be repaid over a 20 year period. After The Heritage Center opens, revenues derived form nominal admission charges, gift shop and food service operations as well as facility leasing, must provide sufficient funds to cover operational costs and retirement of the bond debt. Over and above this, a signed agreement with Chatham County requires that we meet two specific milestones: the first requires that \$1.5 million be available the date the doors of The Heritage Center open; second, that a total of \$3 million be available one year from opening. This money will be used to meet the initial obligations of debt service until positive cash flow is achieved. To date we have just over \$1 million in secured pledges and cash towards this end. Cash on hand is \$381,653.05, so anyone can see that we have quite a way to go towards meeting the obligation to the County. Every penny that has been received since 1 September 1993, has been invested towards reaching the \$3 million obligation. It would help considerably for units and individuals to honor their pledges as soon as possible. None of this money is being used for operations, again every penny is being invested and will ultimately go in to "bricks and mortar". If you haven't joined or made a contribution to The Heritage Center, do so today. Our fund raising efforts are continuing and are absolutely vital to the success of The Heritage Center!


The revenue bonds, issued by The Savannah Economic Development Authority (SEDA) on behalf of Chatham County, are going out on the market in mid March and will total \$12.5 million. The annual pay back will be approximately \$1.2 million per year for 20 years. The Chatham County Commissioners voted unanimously on 24 February for final authorization on the sale of the bonds.

I want to express my personal appreciation for the tremendous support everyone has given and continues to give The Heritage Center project. From the initial action by The Eighth Air Force Historical Society of providing the seed money, to the subsequent excellent and continuing support of the many units and State Chapters as well as individuals, it has been a most gratifying and noble experience. I salute all of our many strong supporters. Please share this letter and information with your newsletter editors and membership at large. The Heritage Center staff joins me in extending these expressions of appreciation and best wishes to you and the members of your group.



#### AIR FORCE COMBAT UNITS OF WWII

"The following info is in reference to page 51 (see actual reproduction of enclosure below) and the Presidential Unit Citation. The Watts Aerospace Library edited by Major James F. Sunderman and Major Gene Gurney of the U.S. Air Force book program, USAF Historical Division, Air University, Dept. of the Air Force. prepared the draft in 1957/58 of a 506 page book "AIR FORCE COMBAT UNITS OF WWII". The 457th data is on pages 332-333 with a listing ..... DECORATIONS: NONE.

For the other two bomb groups of the 94th Wing, the 351st received the DUC for its efforts on 9 October 1943 and 11 January 1944. The 401st received a DUC for 11 January 1944 and 20 February 1944. The 94th Wing received the DUC for action of 11 January 1944. This may entitle 457th personel to display the ribbon until they were reassigned.

I counted a total of 15 groups in the 8th AF (9-B-24 .. 6-B-17) that did not have a DUC (Distinguished Unit Citation) and as might be expected, they began combat operations in 1944. The attacks on aircraft factories on 11 January 1944 appeared to have earned a DUC. The single DUC for the 452nd Bg B17 Group was earned on 7 April 1945 for accurate bombing of a jet fighter base, in spite of strong fighter attacks and heavy flak.

It is not too surprising that the 19th BG received six (6) DUC's before returning to the U.S. in late 1942. Of the 3 Air Divisions of the 8th AF. only the 1st received a DUC. This was for the 11 January 1944 attack."

Bombed targets in France during the first week of Jun 1944 in preparation for the Normandy invasion, and attacked coastal defenses along the Cherbourg peninsula on D-Day. Struck airfields, railroads, fuel

depots, and other interdictory targets behind the invasion beaches throughout the remainder of the month. Resumed bombardment of strategic objectives in Jul 1944 and engaged chiefly in such operations until Apr 1945. Sometimes flew support and interdictory missions, aiding the advance of ground forces during the St Lo breakthrough in Jul 1944 and the landing of British 1 Airborne Division during the airborne attack on Holland in Sep 1944; and participating in the Battle of the Bulge, Dec 1944-Jan 1945, and the assault across the Rhine in Mar 1945. Flew last combat mission on 20 Apr 1945. Transported prisoners of war from Austria to France after V-E Day. Returned to the US in Jun 1945. Inactivated on 28 Aug 1945.

### D.U.C. - WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

In the continuing debate as to whether the DUC, which many of the members of the 457th recall receiving and indeed which several have listed on their Military Records & Report of Separation and under the Decorations worn by Group members (WHILE IN ENGLAND) was the Presidential Unit Citation and /or the Distinguished Unit Citation ... and what differences differentiates the two.

To answer this question, I refer to "The United States Air Force Dictionary"; 1956 Edition published by the Research Studies Institute, Air University Press and published as an Official U.S. Document by the U.S. Government Printing Office.

#### **DEFINITIONS:**

Distinguished Unit Citation: The highest award given by the U.S. to any Military Unit in the U.S. or Allied Armed Forces. The DUC was first established by Executive Order in 1942. It is given for "extraordinary heroism in action against an armed enemy of the U.S." It takes precedence over all other U.S. Unit Citations.

Presidential Unit Citation: A U.S. Navy Unit Citation, corresponding to the Distinguished Unit Citation. Definition #2: A MISNOMER for the Distinguished Unit Citation.

NOTE: Currently, (as of 1956) the DUC award is made by the Department of the Air Force.

Ed. note: Thanks, Paul for researching this subject, but I just have a feeling there will be several responses to this explanation ... but my question would be: [Did the same rules apply prior to 1956 when the Dept. of Air Force took over and who was the governing authority prior to 1956?] If you have an opinion, let us hear from you. Letter to Mr. Craig Harris, Durham, NC

Dear Craig:

I have finished reading the 36th issue of the 457th Bomb Group Association News Letter, and feel that I should call to your attention to a couple mistakes in the article pertaining to the mid-air collision of Bad Time Inc II and Arfn Arf on November 8, 44.

First, the collison happened over the English Channel and not the sea. Also, Bad Time Inc II was not flying in the lower position but was flying in the upper position. When the collision occured, Arf'n Arf was apparently hit by an up-draft of wind and the two planes collided. The two internal engines props hit Arf'n Arf approximately half way from the front to the rear on top of the plane, cutting it in half, and Arf'n Arf fell into the English Channel.

The impact knocked out the two internal engines (number 2 & 3) on Bad Time Inc, jammed the ball turret with the gunner still inside, knocked a large hole in the waist of the plane and knocked the left horizontal stabilizer from the tail of the plane. Needless to say, this destroyed some of the controls of Bad Time Inc II.

The collision happened at 20,000 feet. Bad Time Inc II plane was thrown into a downward dive at about 20 to 25 degrees, and the plane leveled out at 11,000 feet. The reason for not leaving the plane was because the ball turret gunner was inside the turret. The crew finally got him out after the plane leveled out. The gunner still has a plate in his head from the collision.

Second, Bad Time Inc II did not make it back to Glatton, but landed at the first location that appeared to have a runway that could handle a B-17. Apparently that was at the 2nd Strategic Air Depot near Blockpool. Bad Time Inc II did not land at 2nd Strategic Air Depot on November 9, 1944, but landed there on November 8, 1944. As Bad Time Inc II was making it's approach to land, another engine went out and the plane landed with one engine operating. The plane held together long enough to get the crew on the ground, but no way could it take off again.

Bad Time Inc II crew is the crew with it's ten original men still alive. We are wondering if there is another crew that has been this fortunate.

Dear Johnny,

I was very pleased to receive your letter regarding mistakes in the 'ARF  ${\cal E}$  'ARF story in the latest 457th BG Newsletter. You are correct on both counts, and information from others, chiefly that of Harold Rothbard, who sent me a whole bunch of stuff, confirms the accuracy of your version.

However, your comments to bring on more talk. First, you are quite correct that the final moments of 'ARF & 'ARF took place over the English Channel. I knew that, and I so stated in the summary events of 08-NOV-44, bottom of page 10 of the NL, (where I erroneously stated that "Bad Time Inc. II\* returned to Glatton). The comment to which you correctly objected, "...crashed into the sea." is a quote from the FlyPast article by Paddy Porter. I think "...the sea.." was Paddy's choice of a writer's term. We all knew that it was the English Channel.

The Information that 44-8418 wound up at 2nd Strategic Air Depot may well be correct; it is from Paul Andrews's "Bits & Pieces of the Mighty Eighth", which has been at least 90% accurate. But when I wrote that 2SAD was near Blackpool (Warton), I was completely mistaken. That was 2nd Base Air Depot. 2SAD turns out to have been at Abbotts Ripton, adjacent to the Alconbury airfield, and only 6 miles from our base at Glatton. I think that test flights from 2SAD used the Alconbury field, and it was where our airplanes were whenever someone said, "Our plane's down at Alconbury for repair". Andrews's data go on to say about 44-8418: "09 11 44 2BAD SAL" which means that it was junk and assigned there, whether it was physically there or not (yet). Final entry is: "10 1 45 SAL", which means that it was completely written off on the 10th of Jan., 45.

I think you told me that you did not go in "Bad Time Inc. II" on that fatal day. Harold Rothbard confirms that in the material he sent. However he did go, and in a story published in the 8th AF News, Jan. 1990, says, "Thanks to pilot Eldorf we crash landed on the airstrip at Dover". In a news story about James Jenkins, it says that, with 2 engines running, they headed for England, and managed to land at the first airstrip they saw, and that a 3rd engine went out just before landing. So undoubtedly "Bad Time Inc. II" was dismantled and trucked to Alconbury as junk.

I am delighted to hear from you, and thank you for calling attention to our mistakes. I doubt that there is any crew in the 457th as fortunate as yours in keeping everyone together and alive.

I am enclosing 2 snaps of you and Delores at the San Antonio reunion, which I failed to send earlier. Belatedly, it is a good chance to tell you how much we appreciate you two pitching in to help at the luncheon, and the photos commemorate that. Best regards to you both.

## National cemeteries running out of space

WASHINGTON (AP) — National cemeteries, where more than 2 million American veterans and dependents are buried, are running out of space

Fifty-six of the 114 national cemeteries administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs already have exhausted available grave sites. Others are filling rapidly as the remaining 8 million World War II veterans grow older.

"We expect to have to close one cemetery a year for the next three years," spokesman Rick Arndt of the VA's National Cemetery System said in a recent interview. "Several more are projected to close before the year 2000."

Finding additional space, officials say, is a challenge second only to creating the first "cemetery grounds" for the hundreds of thousands of Union soldiers killed during the Civil War.

About 2.04 million American veterans and dependents have been buried in VA-administered national cemeteries in the ensuing 133 years.

Thousands more have been interred in Arlington National Cemetery and the Soldiers' and Airmen's Home, both managed by the Army in the Washington area.


Fourteen other national cemeteries are maintained by the Department of the Interior, such as Gettysburg and others closely associated with national battlefields.

Arndt says the VA's National Cemetery System has space available for only 230,000 more caskets and the cremated remains of 50,000 other servicemen and women, although it owns land that could be developed for another 1.6 million grave sites.

However, there are nearly 27 million eligible veterans, many of whom are expected to be buried in national cemeteries. Thus, the hunt for new space.

The VA is developing new cemeteries near Seattle, Albany, N.Y., and Dallas and hopes to create additional sites soon near Cleveland, Chicago and Oklahoma City.

The first 14 national cemeteries were created in 1862 when Congress authorized President Lincoln to purchase sites "for soldiers who

shall have died in the service of the country."

By 1870, the remains of nearly 300,000 Union dead had been buried in 73 cemeteries, most in the Southeast near the Civil War battlefields and campgrounds. In 1873, the cemeteries were opened to all honorably discharged U.S. veterans

Then, as the nation moved West, national cemeteries associated with military posts were created. Today, the cemeteries contain the remains of veterans of every war and conflict, ranging from the Revolutionary War to the Persian Gulf

National cemeteries occupy more than 11,000 acres from Maine to Hawaii and from Alaska to Puerto Rico. In addition, the American Battle Monuments Commission created after World War I administers 24 burial grounds in foreign countries.

National cemeteries that still have space generally are open to veterans who have been killed in action or honorably discharged from active duty and, in many cases, their spouses and dependent children. In recent years, about one-fourth of the more than 68,000 burials each year have been those of dependents.

Grave sites may not be reserved. Families seeking burial sites should contact the nearest national cemetery or VA regional office.

Grave sites and grave liners are provided free of charge. In addition, the VA prepares and closes the graves, furnishes headstones or markers and provides perpetual

The VA also drapes caskets with American flags, which then are given to the families. Memorial certificates bearing the president's signature and expressing the nation's recognition of deceased person's service are available.

While the VA does not furnish military honors, cemetery superintendents usually can provide sources for such ceremonies.

### Don't snub U.K.

President Clinton's decision to skip V-E Day ceremonies in London for ceremonies in Arlington and Moscow is a political blunder that should be corrected immediately. While visiting Russia, another ally from World War II, is important, so is strengthening our relationship with Great Britain.

The fact is that Clinton is ignoring what every previous administration has recognized since World War I — the United States and Great Britain have a special relationship.

British and American troops fought side by side in Europe; it was Great Britain that stood alone after Hitler had overrun the rest of the continent, Great Britain that survived the Luftwaffe's vicious onslaught in the Battle of Britain, Great Britain that repaired to Africa to continue the fight against the Nazis.

The fires of World War II forged a link between the United States and the United Kingdom stronger than almost any other alliance.

By history and culture, our two nations are family; not always close, but, as with most families, there for the other when needed.

On the other hand, our alliance with Russia was an alliance of convenience. Originally, Stalin signed a nonaggression pact with Hitler and was willing to cut deals to divide Poland and take outright the Baltic states.

It was only when Hitler attacked Russia, pushing the Red Army nearly to the point of collapse, that Stalin was willing to deal with the capitalistic United States. The relationship was never warm between the two governments, and Stalin never trusted the other Allies.

Still, the Russian people paid heavily for Hitler's ambition in World War II. More Russians were killed in World War II than all other peoples killed in all other wars combined — in the neighborhood of 20 million.

For that reason, it would be wrong for Clinton to cancel his Moscow visit. The Russian people absorbed tremendous losses to stop Hitler's eastward expansion, and without their sacrifice who knows when, or if, the Nazis would have been stopped.

But seeking closer ties with Russia should not come at the expense of our closest, most dependable ally. Clinton properly belongs in both London and Moscow; Hitler was not defeated at Arlington, but in the blood-soaked fields and skies of Europe.

The president should adjust his schedule to visit both London and Moscow for V-E Day — a perfect solution since Great Britain and Russia celebrate the observance one day apart.

Instead, the Japanese government is more worried about potential embarrassment by ceremonies marking the end of the war than it is in paying restitution to the many Asian countries that suffered under the heel of Japan's military dictatorship.

Unlike Germany, which has expended both emotional and financial capital in confronting its role in World War II, Japan often tries to present itself in the victim's role—especially where the two atomic bombs that finally ended World War II are concerned.


