Dear Compatriot Fireballers,

I know we must have one of the most generous memberships among the 8th Air Force Associations. Thank you for your wonderful response to my request for funds to help defray the costs of the English Historian"s trip to the Reunion. The fund is looking great.

The books will remain open for your checks up until Reunion time. If you have not given yet, would you please consider it. We will announce

the total amount in Savannah.

I will always remember the special relationship between our pilot, Bob Krumm, and our crew chief, Sumner Marshall and his ground crew. We had named our Bird the Flak Dodger. It was one of the first silver B-17s the 457th received. Our crew and the ground crew were very proud of her. I was the Radio Operator.

Krumm, who was an experienced pilot and loved flying, was out on the ramp at odd times talking to Marshall, who had an exceptional mechaical background. They were both a "little older" and experienced in their

jobs. We catered to each others needs.

On June 14, 1944, John Barret, Tail Gunner, Shirley Marx, Waist Gunner, and I, were hit, on my 27th Mission. Krumm landed the Flak Dodger with one engine operating and two windmilling props. The ground crew popped into the waist as soon as the airplane stopped. We were really glad to see them before they took us to the Hospital. I wish I could remember their names. Would appreciate it if any of them read this, if they would

drop me a line and come to the Reunion.

The Flak Dodger was shot up so badly, I thought it would never fly again. However, it was sent to the repair depot and came back to the 457th to be under the expert care of Sumner Marshall and his crew once again. Clayton Bejot and his crew picked it up and did all their missions in it. Sumner was made Line Chief. The Flak Dodger was flown back to Sioux Falls when the 457th shut down. I will always believe its longevity was largely because of the genial Sumner Marshal and the expertise of he and his crew. Many times they stayed up all night getting our planes ready to fly the next day. I remember them always looking tired. It seems like they had all their meals from their mess kits in their tent.

Our Savanna Reunion is dedicated to all the ground people of the 457th. I write of the ones on the flight line because they are the ones I knew best. There were many others in other jobs. And all of them felt the pressure of keeping us in the air. We could not have done it without you. I hope you all can come to the reunion and enjoy being in the limelight.

You deserve it.

May I ask you again, will you please vote "YES" on the motion for us to donate \$10,000 to the 8th Air Force Heritage Museum when it comes up at the Business Meeting. We have had encouraging remarks in favor of this idea. I feel strongly this will leave ample funds in the Life Membership money to supplement our operationsl expenses for as long as we are able to carry on.

Nominating Committee Chairman, Ken Blakebrough, reports his committee has selected their choice of nominees. Of course, further nominations

from the floor will be welcomed.

Reunion Chairman, Craig Harris, has cooked us up a reunion which I believe will go down in our Reunion History as one of the most enjoyable and well attended. I hope you can all be there.

This is my "Swan Song" Presidential message. I want to thank you all for your wonderful participation and support during my two terms of holding this office. You made the job easy. I look forward to remaining active in our beloved 457th Bomb Group Association.

AGENDA ITEMS I WOULD LIKE TO PRESENT TO THE MEMBERSHIP AT THE 1997 REUNION IN SAVANNAH

[All legal interpretations and legal wording should be rewritten by our Legal Consel, Mr. James Bass, and acted accordingly on subject to our By-Laws prior to presentation to/or vote by the Members]

Wherear: The 457th Bomb Group Membership is distributed throughout the United States, and Wherear there are (7) elected Officers, (namely President, Vice President, Sec/Treasurer, (3) Board Members and an immediate Past President) and, Wherear: We have (4) Time Zones in the United States; (Eastern, Central Mountain & Pacific); THEREFORE be it revolved that NO Time Zone shall have over (2) two elected (having voting rights) Officials representing the 457th Bomb Group at any time. (Europe, Africa, Asia would be within the confines of the Eastern Time Zone; Alaska, Hawaii, and all Pacific Islands, including Australia) shall be in the Pacific Time Zone). [Ed note: This allocation would not cause a problem since we only plan on electing (1) New Board Member every two years (subject to resignation and death), which would mean that every two years. two time zones with (1) member would vie for the opening).

Whereas: The 457th Bomb Group was stationed in England during World War II, and Whereas. there are a group of British citizens assisting in the continuance of good relationship in preserving the Heritage and well being of the 457th Bomb Group, THEREFORE be it resolved: that a British Assistant Director (Assistant meaning they have no voting rights and would be categorized similar to our two Assistant Sec/Treas. of today) be elected to serve on the Board. It would not be prudent for this Board (the 457th) to recommend their method of electing their Official. [ED Note: It would seem to me that a recommendation of an elected Officer not being able to be re-elected, but could be elected every 4 years. It would be my recommendation that this election take place at the Mini-Reunion in England every two years.]

I submit the above recommendations in the Best of Interest to further improve our wonderful Bomb Group.

The Army Air Corps needed men to fly, To be the long arm to hit the foe. He bravely said, "I'm ready to go, Just give me a plane and off I'll go!"


The wild blue yonder was his new domain, To be a great warrior his chosen destiny, Challenging the enemy in far-flung skies, His silver wings a glorious sight to see.

8TH AIR FORCE REVEALS SECRET FIGHTER UNIT AIDED BOMBER FORCE

P-51 Mustangs are manned by Lead Pilots who had completed one or more combat tours in bombers.

Headquarters 8th Air Force revealed the presence of a Fighter Force, made up of ex-Bomber pilots flying P-51 Mustangs, with the primary mission of leading bomber formations through hazardous weather reporting target conditions and helping to defend the bombers against German fighters.




Lt. Col. Allison C. Brooks

In a May 1945 broadcast on the Armed Forces Network, Lt. Col. Allison C. Brooks, Commander of the 1st Division Scouts, revealed that the Scouting Forces had been in operation since July 1944, flying approximately 20 minutes in advance of the Bomber Stream to every target flown by the heavies of the 8th Air Force.

The Scouting Force concept was not the idea of a single individual but the man who made it happen was Col. Budd J. (Uncle Budd) Peaslee, former commander of the 384th Bomb Group, who had suffered through many missions where weather determined the success or failure of the venture. Colonel Peaslee formed the original unit known as the Scouting Force (Experimental), which operated from July thru September 1944 and flew 35 missions from Steeple Morden. Upon completion of this phase, General Doolittle authorized Scouting Forces for all 3 Air Divisions.

The Scouting Force concept was proposed in late 1943 but could not be implemented until an aircraft was available that had range equal to the bombers. That airplane was the P-51 Mustang. They were made available in mid-1944.

[Ed Note: Thanks so very much to Steve Billisits of Erie, PA for the above article. Steve, in his cover letter also stated that Robert T. Bennet, of the 457th, was killed, in training and that Robert Burkholder of Tucson, AZ actually served a tour in the Unit. This is the first information I have seen on this operation since 1944 and very few people are aware of its existance. It is of particular interest to me since I was in the 3rd class (early Sept. 44). I had completed my missions and was given the choice of returning home for leave (only to come back 6-8 weeks later for a 2nd tour, or volunteering for this duty ... and after 25 missions of "advanced weather" flying. Participation in this was voluntary and your final decision had to be made after 6 hours training in the P-51 plus groundschool, and an evalution flight in the British Mosquito (the mosquito training was a story in itself). On decision day ... I was asked whether I wanted to continue, or return to the States on leave. My response was a question ... "How many P-51's were sent out today?... and their answer was "3". I then asked "How many returned?" and when their answer was "NONE" ... my mind was quickly made up, without hesitation and I returned home, a decision I have never regretted. The time was early September 1944. C'est le vie.] Let us hear from other's who might have served in this unit.] Dave Summerville.

I just don't have the nerve to cash the check under the pretense that I didn't notice the date on the check.

With all that has happened in the past re: Post Office, there is bound to be a sequel to this story.

OBITUARIES....

MAC LACKEY, Sr - November 11, 1995

In a letter in early 1996, Mac Jr. informed Dale Jeffers of the passing of his father on the above date. Dale responded to Mac Jr. as follows:

Dear Mac Jr.:

I am saddened to hear of the death of your father Mac, Sr. I had talked to him about coming to the Memorial Bench Dedication at the Air Force Museum here at Wright-Patterson AFB in August of '93, and again about coming to the Reunion in Reno in November. He just didn't feel up to it.

As you may know, Mac and I flew only one mission together. He had been co-pilot to Capt. Douglas Deal, on a Lead Crew, until Doug was moved up into Operations. I was moved into that crew, intact, at that time, but we had been living in the same Quonset Hut for about 25 missions before that, so we knew each other very well.

Mac was my co-pilot on the now famous mission to Politz, Germany, on which our Commanding Officer, Colonel James Luper was shot down. I was flying Luper's right wing, as the Deputy Group Leader, when he started to leave the formation, and we continued over the target and dropped our bombs, with the other aircraft dropping on the sight of our bombs. We lost one engine, number three, (on Mac's side) and the propeller ran away. I had had one lecture, by a pilot who had thrown a propeller, on how to do it when it was necessary. We lost 15,000 feet in the process, and we were able to extinguish the fire, and found that another engine was loosing power. We came home at 10,000 feet, just aabove the undercast, so that if any enemy fighters attacked we could dive into the undercast. When we landed, an hour behind the others, I told Mac to ask the tower "if we should just taxi this wreck directly to the "boneyard"... and he did. When we pulled up into our hard-stand, it was like Lindbergh landing at Le Bourget ... everybody who had a friend aboard was waiting to see how he was. Our bombardier, John Traylor, headed straight to the de-briefing room and wrote me up for the Silver Star Medal. It came back as a Distinguished Flying Cross instead. After that, Mac got checked out as a first pilot and we never flew together again.

I have a newspaper clipping about the Memorial Bench Dedication, but I can't Fax anything that I don't type, so I will be sending it by mail.

I deeply appreciate your letter and obituary, and your request that I pass it on. I'll call Cedric Priest, the only other member of Mac's original crew, and with your permission, I would like to send both your letter, and the obituary, to the 457th Newsletter Editor for publication. Have you notified Mary Deal?





Victory and Freedom Medal of Poland

It was awarded to all who rendered assistance during WWII. All allied service personnel who participated in the fight against Germany and Italy from 1939-45 are eligible for this medal. It is a circular bronze medal with an eagle in the center, suspended from a ribbon of three red bars, two white bars.

The medal may be purchased from Wolciech Stela, PL-01, 365 Warszawa 83, 01 Oswiatowa 6/2. The full-sized medal and extra ribbon for a ribbon bar costs \$22 which includes postage. The simplest way to do this is to send Stela a check or money order for \$22 in U.S. dollars. I know of no current source for the miniature.

457TH BOMB GROUP QUESTIONS

Questions have arisen concerning eligibility for membership in the Association and the classification and rights of members in each classification. The following may clarify the concerns.

- Q: Who is eligible for Membership?
- A: Any person abiding by the objectives of the Association. The stated objectives of the Association are, "the preservation of the historical significance of the 457th Bombardment Group (H), United States Army Corps, and the continuity of a spirit of friendship and camaraderie, which first came into being as a result of military service in that organization during World War II".
 - Q: What are the classifications of Membership?
 - A: Regular Members, Life Members and Associate Members.
 - Q: Who is a Regular Member?
- A: A Regular Member is a dues paying member and is entitled to all rights and privileges of membership, including the right to attend meetings, the right to vote, to serve as an officer or director, and to receive Association publications.
 - Q: Who is a Life Member?
- A: Regular Members may become Life Members upon payment of Life Membership dues, which are established in the bylaws on a sliding scale from age 50 years upward. Additionally, the surviving spouse of any Regular Member or Life Member of the Association who served with the 457th Bomb Group (H) during the period of time it was stationed in the United Kingdom is under the bylaws, a Life Member and exempt from payment of dues, and is entitled to all the privileges of Membership.
 - Q: Who is an Associate Member?
- A: A person who agrees to abide by the objectives of the Association. The Associate Member pays no dues, cannot vote or serve as an officer or director of the Association, (but can attend meetings), and does not receive Association publications.
 - Q: How are all these membership categories established?
- A: The organizational structure is established by the bylaws. The bylaws can be amended by a majority vote at any meeting (subject to complying with other provisions such as notice).







Many of you may not know the complete story of "THE STONE AMERICAN"

Many of you helped from the beginning in adding, caring for and repairing of the-"THE STONE AMERICAN".

If any of you come to the reunion, the whole story has been

kept and put into a book. Be sure to read it all.

In 1945 an Airman's head was sculptured by Les Fried. It was attached to a 5ft foot monument. On the front was a wreathe inside it was written 'FAIT ACCOMPLI'. It was set to look over the 457th Air run-way. It was located in Conington Church yard and was dedicated in 1945 by the Airforce. Col Rogner unveiled the Monument. Col J.B. Roberts was also in attendance, as well Jerome J Heyman. These are the only names I have.

In 1968, a Peterborough Citizen & Advertiser news paper gave a story of 'A forgotten memorial' the story of Battered by the winters of more than two decades of a forgotten memorial by

all.

Tourists included a USAF 457th Sergeant Dan Graham & was so concerned about the memorial that he started to search for someone to look after, without success.

The children seeing it, did not have a clue what it was for

or for whom. The monument was crumbling away.

Perhaps the mission of those war-time airmen was accomplished, but the mission of remembrance and respect for those who gave

the supreme sacrifice should never end.

Three months later, the Peterborough News paper had another article. 'Suddenly it seems everyone is interested in the memorial...the last week has seen activity on both sides of the Atlantic'. Daniel Graham had asked a St Ives firm of Monumental Masons, Wayman Funeral Service, to see if the memorial could be repaired. From NJ, USA another ex-airman who served in the Conington area in the War, Jerome J Heyman, has written to the Commanding Officer at the USAF base at Alconbury, after he had read the article.

Dan Graham, in the meantime, asked the work on the memorial

to be done and paid for it his self.

Alconbury answered Jerome, saying he has not known about the monument and asked some detail...No way to pay for upkeep from the American Battle Monuments Commission's European Office in Paris.

In this case, a Britisher, whose mother is buried nearby has expressed his willingness to keep the memorial neat and tidy, if so required as his own tribute. (December 4, 1986). The man was George Townsend, his son Gordon also helped him. George had worked at Alconbury many years, & lived in Sawtry. In August 1970, a mower was presented by the USAF, near the

Concrete American, so named by the News paper.

In 1971, Homer Briggs & Buddies started the 457th Association. When we started locating men & planning a reunion, Dan Graham contact us and told us of his dream of a marble plaque, that he had made, to be attached to the Memorial. The wording on the marble is: LEST WE FORGET In perpetual memory of those Valiant American Airmen of the 457th Bomb Group H who, during World War II gave their lives that Freedom might prevails....

Our first reunion, Dan attended & told of his efforts, all present donated to the expenses, and he wrote back after going home, --it was one of the greatest experiences, I have ever

had. Bill Siler picked up the plaque and arranged shipment via Townsend arranged George military transport (MATS). installations.

Ones helping to do this: James Mazza, Al Martinez, Charles McClane, A.L. Ladner, Joe Falcone, August DeRosa, Homer Briggs, Wm Closs, Winfred Kincaid, Wm.Hite, Minor Lehmoan, Wm Siler, Roy James, Wm Goodfellow, Dee Owsley, James Carey, Fred Burkhart, Elmer Wright, Dr Richard Crow, Summer Marshall, Wm L Smith, Frank Anderson, Hershel Teague, Paul Birchen, Ken Kinyon, George Conover, Ken Rurode, Jim Day, and Eugene H Butscha.

Several vistors to the Monument began writing the perpendicular

shaft was in bad shape.

In 1975, while visiting the English for the first contact, Homer visited Andrew T Greeley, Chief Office of Info-Hqs 10th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing USAAF. He was not in, but later wrote and said, he was sorry that they were unable to help rebuild the monument. Maybe The Dept of Army, who supported WWII memorials of former Air Force and Army units overseas, might assist. In the long run, No Help!! We asked for donations, and the group came thru and it was repaired once again. In 1982, the monument began to need repair again. Tom Goff was Committee chairman- to replace the 6 ft monument "maintenance free" stone sculpture. Located on the same spot. The original monument and head was taken to Barksdale Museum in Shreveport, La by Tom Goff. Many of the Group donated once again towards the final monument. Bernard Bains took over the Caretaker for the monument in 1983. We now have a mini-social reunion on the even numbered year. We have it during the Mattenly Cemetary in Cambridge, England -to conside with American's Memorial Day. We decorate the monument there and also at the Stone American. So very many of the 457th ers have visited with their families in the Church yard. Dan Graham played the Church organ, as David Briggs pumped it. This was the last time Dan visited there. (I belive)............MB.



HOW TO GET THERE

Come to Savannah by I-95 from the North and the South, and I-16 from the West. To get to downtown Savannah from I-95, take Exit 17 onto I-16 East. [If you come from the West on I-16, just keep rolling when you get to I-95.] Take I-16 to the end, exiting on Montgomery St.

Continue on Montgomery St. for about 10-12 blocks, and after you go around a second square, 2 blocks later you come to W. Bay St. Turn right onto W. Bay St (which is also US 80 East) and proceed to your hotel. The Days Inn is at 200 W. Bay St., on your right. The Hyatt Regency is a block farther, on the other side at Two West Bay St. Continuing down Bay St., the Hampton Inn is at 201 East Bay St. (the change from West to East is at Bull St, just after the Hyatt Regency). Continuing on down Bay St. toward the Savannah Marriott Riverfront, you will pass The Mulberry Hotel on your right at 601 E. Bay St., and at this point begin to stay left near the centerline of the street, to avoid a right-turn-only lane coming up as you approach Broad St. As you pass Broad St., Bay St. becomes General MacIntosh Blvd. Continuing straight ahead, you begin a swing to the right and go down a small decline. As you cross the railroad, the Savannah Marriott Riverfront is quite visible on the left. Come on in and celebrate your arrival. The bar is in the lobby.

IMPORTANT WHEELCHAIR NOTE: If you have a wheelchair-bound in your party, bring your wheel-chair. The Heritage Museum has only a limited number of wheelchairs. For the bus rides to and from the Museum, bus drivers will assist those who can board the bus, and store wheelchairs in the luggage compartment. In the parking garage under the hotel, there are handicapped parking places on the ground level, at the far left near the hotel's Garage Entrance. Elevators are just inside that entrance. If you need assistance, come instead to the main ground-level hotel entrance where assistance is available. The elevators are also close to that entrance as well.







Expect the weather to be mild, nice. Daytime temperatures can be in the seventies, and casual light clothing should be comfortable. Evenings and early mornings can be cool, and a light wrap may be needed, expecially in the late evening.

IMPORTANT NOTE ABOUT THE BUSES TO THE HERITAGE MUSEUM!! Some of you requested the second shift (9:45 departure) but were notified that you had been assigned to the first shift (8:15 departure). We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused anyone, and



hope that those affected can alter their plans accordingly. We told you in the Spring 1997 Newsletter that if one shift became filled (138 people), those who registered after that would automatically be assigned to the other shift. Running two shifts of three 46-passenger buses is necessary to keep bus costs reasonable.

DUC AWARD: 4-13-97

Dear Homer,

As a fellow cadre member at Rapid City who, as you, was present at Souix Falls when we were deactivated (After two years with the group I felt betrayed and close to tears, a special greeting.

Further as the one who started this business about two years ago as to the validity of the DUC award being awarded to the Group while overseas, I would like to supply the answer to Colonel Rogner's son Edward concerning his dad's DUC (AS I SEE IT). Hi Edward hope all is well with you and your family.

When I graduated Intelligence School for non-coms at Salt Lake City my dad sent me a very valuable book on Military and Naval Recognition showing among other facts pictures of all the medals and ribbons issued; from Washington right to the date of publications (1943). He stated it might be of use to me in my work. If he could know that I will be quoting it fifty four years later I am sure he would be very surprised!

The book not only shows in color the awards but also goes into the history of the award and the circumstances under which

it can be worn (temporarily or permanently).

So I shall take these up first and then apply the regulations to your dad. The Royal Blue Citation Ribbon was established by authority of EXECUTIVE ORDER 9075 February 26, 1942.

"It authorizes the Secretary of War to issue a citation in the name of the President as a public evidence of deserved honor and distinction to any organization, unit, detachment or installation of the Army of the United States for outstnding performance of duty in action on or after December 7, 1941....."

"After any organization, unit, detachment is so cited on two or more separate occasions a suitable device (ribbon) identifying such citations shall be issued to all officers and enlisted men who are assigned or attached as members of that organization, the device to become part of the uniform and any individual who was assigned or attached as member of such organization on one of two or more occasions for which citations were issued shall be entitled to wear the individual device as a part of the uniform at all times and wherever serving."

So Edward your dad was first assigned (in England) to the 401st Bomb Gp which was among the oldest groups arriving as part of the 8th AF; then assigned to Polebrook as deputy Commander of the 94th Wing and finally to the 457th, my group which arrived in January 1944 at Glatton. I am sure that since he could be cited as under the 8th AF, or 94th Wing of 1st Division or any 1st division citation and finally under both 401st or 457th Bomb Groups; he most certainly in totally all such citations given to these units; he had more than two to his record and was entitled to wear it, even if he had transfered to the infantry as a rifle man!:

The same can pertain to the 457th citable for itself as a unit; through the 94th Wing as an under unit and 1st division as an under unit and finally through 8th AF citations as an under unit!

I can think of three actions alone that the group participated in which were ideal for receiving citations. 1.

D-Day action, we had two assignments on that day.2. The Shuttle Raid where we supplied 37 air craft on June 21st to the mission, Called "FRANTIC" where 144 8th Air Force Bl7s bombed Romanian Oil Fields, landed on a Russian Field (bombed by the German Air Force that night) and flew back via Italy. 3. The missions we flew during "The BATTLE OF THE BULGE" where we flew missions cuting off supplies from the rear to the Germans, which had cut off the American Army.

TO SETTLE THIS MATTER ONCE AND FOR ALL I FEEL WITH ALL THE AUTHORS AND LAWYERS WE HAVE--WE SHOULD APPOINT A COMMITTEE AT SAVANNAH OF HISTORIANS TO APPROACH THE AIRFORCE ON A HIGH LEVEL: WE SHOULD ALSO GET THE 8th AF SOCIETY to fight our case; after all they are THE EIGHTH AIR FORCE HISTORICAL SOCIETY!

IS THIS TRIP REALLY NECESSARY?

In correspondence with Norman Stevens Jr, ex 749th pilot of "Ladies Delight" he mentions that "Starting in December 1944, the powers that be determined that we should start dropping propaganda leaflets and tell the Germans that they should give serious consideration to surrendering and call it "kaput". It became demoralising for the crews to know that they were carrying just leaflets and therefore it became policy in our squadron, perhaps others also, that they did not know if they were carrying these. Therefore the bomber crew would have no remorse about getting shot at just because they were only carrying a load of paper. As the war began to wind down, I believe more of us were carrying propaganda leaflets than we had anticipated. One plane was decorated on

the tail "Is this trip REALLY necessary?" Every time the rest of us would taxi by this airplane we received a boost in our morale. I would like to think that airplane survived the war, but I dont know."

Delivered to the Group in October 1944, the aircraft was 43-38909 'D' named "Kraut Krusher" from the 748th Squadron which I understand was flown by George Gilbert and Dave Kahne on 35 missions without casualties. Apparently it crash landed in France mid-Feb 1945, believed flown by Lt.Duane Southwood and eventually salvaged 28 Feb 1945.

Perhaps someone will be good enough to write the newsletter with further information on how & when the tail endorsement came into being and events surrounding the forced landing.





As you probably know, The American Air Museum in Britain is nearing completion, and will be opened by Her Majesty The Queen on 1 August 1997. The Museum is dedicated to the US airmen who flew from British bases in World War Two, and will be a living memorial to the 30,000 of them who gave their lives. Thousands of Americans have contributed to this memorial museum; if you are among them, I thank you for your support.

To pay full tribute to the bravery and sacrifice of all who served, we have commissioned a moving memorial sculpture by a young British artist, Renato Niemis. Entitled 'Counting the Cost', a series of fifty-six 6 foot high, 3 foot wide, glass panels will mark the approach to The American Air Museum entrance. Each panel will be engraved with silhouettes of all the aircraft lost by each group of the US 8th and 9th Air Forces flying from British bases in World War Two. These shapes will, symbolically, commemorate the crews lost in action.

The sculpture will cost in the order of \$200,000. We are seeking the support of all associations of the 8th and 9th Air Forces to make this special memorial a reality, in time for it to be dedicated on 1 August, when The American Air Museum is opened.

I hope your Association will be moved to contribute, and that you will bring the memorial sculpture to the attention of your members. Associations which contribute \$2,000 or more, and individuals who contribute \$500 or more, will be acknowledged on a special plaque; all other contributions will be recorded in our Roll of Donors.

Please support this worthwhile memorial project which will be a deeply moving reminder to all Duxford's visitors, both young and old, and of all nationalities, of the brave sacrifices made in World War Two by so many American airmen in the causes of victory, freedom and the rule of law.

'Counting the Cost' - The Duxford Memorial Sculpture

The work I am proposing for Duxford aims to counter balance the elements of power and glory found in the displays of real planes inside the American Hall by indicating the cost of their use outside the building.

The sculpture will consist of 56 glass sheets etched with the general outlines of all the airplanes missing in action from the 8th USAAF, 9th USAAF and US Navy operations from England during WWII.

The work will create a contemplative element to the Museum experience.

The building itself conjures up images of bunker, mausoleum or long barrow. This raises associations with the burial of past warriors and their weapons. The work can act as a frieze around the building echoing the past when the glorious dead were honoured on reliefs recording their actions and their achievements.

The white outlines of the planes will echo the scores kept by pilots as tallies of planes shot down.

The etched planes will float in static formations on a dynamic reflective surface that constantly moves with the observer, conjuring up memories and images of war.


The planes will also be animated by the reflected moving sky, an irony now that they are no longer animated by their human crews.

These etched planes will fly forever, an idealised resting place for these lost formations.

The symbolism of the cross-like shape of the planes in their formations evoke the regimented lines of the war cemetry, whilst the near empty sheets conjure up the potential for counting those not already counted, both in the past and in the future.

THE FIGHT FOR SURVIVAL OF THE 8TH AIR FORCE AND ITS MISSION

The 8th Air Force arrived in England 12 May 1942 with General Ira Eaker Commanding Bomber Command. The first six months of the Eighth Air Force were critical for a variety of reasons:

- 1. Time was short and progress was delayed by preparations made in England to receive combat units.
- 2. The units arrived later than planned with minimum training and personnel.
- 3. Combat began 17 August 1942 but results from daylight bombing were marginal for the first 3 months.
- 4. Units from the fledgling 8th were diverted to North Africa to support the critical situation there.
- 5. Much criticism from high levels, both British and American, against the build up of the 8th and daylight operations put General Eaker in an almost untenable situation.

In December 1942, now as Commander of the 8th, Gen. Eaker took his staff to Casablanca and to Gen. Spaatz's headquarters in Algiers. In a series of high level meetings and conferences, General Eaker was tasked to make the case for the continued daylight bombing of Europe. At the now famous Casablanca Conference of January, 1943, Heads of State and top military leaders met to develop strategy for the conduct of operations against the Axis Powers in Europe.

At the conference General Eaker convinced the combined Joint Chiefs of Staff, Churchill and Roosevelt, that a combined round the clock night and day attack was the best use of air power. His action resulted in the continued development of The Mighty Eighth Air Force of WWII.

Under General Eaker's command the Eighth continued to build and combat capability grew rapidly. By the time General Doolittle took command in January, 1944, the outcome of the air war in Europe was virtually assured, but, massive aerial combat operations were to ensue and had to be won before final victory.

BRIEF OF 8TH AF FORMATION AND ACTIVATION AT SAVANNAH, GEORGIA

Shortly after Pearl Harbor President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill, and the US Joint Chiefs of Staff met to discuss and make decisions concerning conduct of the war in Europe and North Africa. Out of these meetings one of the major decisions made was to establish the Eighth Air Force to conduct daylight operations from England as soon as possible.

General Carl Spaatz, the Commander of US Army Air Force Combat Command was to supervise the formation of the "first of the US Combat Air Forces" in Europe. By 19 January 1942 work was underway to put together all the elements required to bring into being what was destined to become the world's largest and most powerful air force.

On 28 January 1942 the 8th Air Force was activated at Savannah, Georgia, and three days later Col. Asa Duncan received his directive as Commanding Officer. Two armories were taken over, the First Volunteer Regiment of Georgia on Abercorn Street and the Chatham Artillery on Park Avenue. The Command Post of the Eighth Air Force opened on 9 February 1942 at the National Guard Armory at Bull Street and Park Avenue. The Base Command functioned from 611 Abercorn Street while the Savannah Recreational Camp was taken over to house personnel. On 13 February 1942 Bomber Command Headquarters arrived at Savannah under Lt.Col. Newton O. Longfellow and was housed at the Savannah Army Air Base.




The Mighty Eighth Air Force Heritage Museum was built to honor the more than one million men & women who have served in the Eighth since it was created in Savannah in Jan 1942.

A significant "hint" as to what (and who) went into putting a 8-17 into the air was captured by Life Magazine photographer Frank Scherschel for the magazine's April 6, 1942 issue.

It was part of an eight-page "photographic essey" depicting the compat training of air crews at MacDill Field, Florida in the early days of World War II.

These were B-17 E models, and the men who were in training were destined to become the first contingent of the 97th Bomb Group, the first 8th Air Force group to see combat over the continent.

The "Task Force" photo is published in FLAK NEWS not only to show the aircrew, but to contribute a visual presentation on some of the support personnel that were required to back up the flyers.

A timely publication, what with the annual 398th Bomb Group reunion in San Diego, Nov. 6-9, dedicated to the ground support personnel.

The April 6, 1942 Life Magazine was contributed to FLAK NEWS by M.E. Boswell, 602 pilot who retired from the Air Force as Lleutenant General Boswell, assistant vice chief of staff.

Life Magazine at the time showed Henry R. Luce as Managing Editor. It was his wife, Congresswoman Clare Booth Luce, who visited the 398th at Nuthampstead in October, 1944. A poem, written after being given a ride in a Fortress by Capt. Kearie Berry, is part of the 398th history book, REMEMBRANCES.

The April 6, 1942 Life Magazine will be on display at the memory room at the San Diego reunion.

Retirees should consider taking their original DD-214 to the County Clerk/Recorder to have it officially recorded. A replacement DD-214 can be obtained by sending a request to CDR ARPERCED, ATTN ARPC-VSE-VO, 97 Page Blvd, St. Louis, MO .. 63132-5200. However, this takes time and requires a variety of information — not a good method in an emergency. Once again .. TAKE HEED.



An example came from Thomas L. Winterbottom and his wife, Edie, who sent us a copy of a sauvenir supplement published by a newspaper in England. Winterbottom, who was the first sergeant of an 8th Air Force equadron stationed at Wattisham-Hitcham near Ipswich, in East Anglia, received the copy, as Edie explained in an accompanying note, "from a friend who visits our town every year or so and he brought this paper over this year. Thought you might like to read it."


Photos show eircraft taking off, over enemy territory, cresh landings and Yanks entertaining village children at American bases at Christmas. There are pictures of huts in which the GIs lived and aboard bicycles that were their main transportation on and off the base.

Tony Smith, who compiled and wrote the stories in the Evening Telegraph, explained why the supplement was produced in a story with the headline: Yanks for the memory.

He wrote: "From the summer of 1942, thousands of young American servicemen descended on Northhamptonshire, formed a bond with their English hosts that still exists.

"Almost overnight the high-spirited Yanks stirred up as much excitement in the county's quiet market towns and sleepy little villages as the Sacond World War itself.

"For 1.006 days the sky was never empty as the brave young men of the 8th United States Army Air Force added their military might to the fight against Hitler. Many were never to return.



"Young, fresh, well-fed and confident they could win the war, they came with one aimthe destruction of Germany's ability to wage war on Europe. Their method was high-attitude precision bombing using techniques developed in the clear blue skies of Georgia. "Meny were little more than kida. Barely old enough to drive in most states, these rookie filers were expected to orew huge Flying Fortresses on raids 30,000 feet above enemy territory.
